ACTIVITIES DONE

The outreach showcased a holistic approach to healthcare, combining education, prevention, diagnosis, and treatment. These activities were carried out in accordance with national health policies and guidelines, ensuring thorough care and effective management of various health conditions in the community



General Health Services:

Provided deworming for children, except those under one year old. Conducted laboratory tests for Malaria and Urinalysis, managing positive cases appropriately.



Counseling: Counseling was tailored to address the specific needs of the children based on their medical conditions. For each condition, the focus of the sessions varied



Dispensing: based on clinical officer prescriptions after diagnosis and testing was completed. As children received their medications, they were educated on proper usage and provided with advice on adhering to their treatment regimens.



Hair Cuts: Due to tinea capitis, we were grateful for Diana, a first-time team member from Embrace Uganda, who kindly donated funds to shave all childrens' hair.



CHALLENGE

The need to record each child's details by hand led to delays, especially when dealing with large numbers of children. Implementation of a digital registration system would significantly improve efficiency. Using tablets or laptops for electronic registration could streamline the process, reduce human error, and allow for quicker access to information.

Conducting urinalysis using a microscope, prolonged the waiting time for children and delayed the overall service delivery. Procuring a Urine Analyzer, which can provide results in just 2 minutes.



LEADERSHIP TRAINING

With support from Embrace Uganda, over 100 leaders, local civic, clan, and church leaders, who are very important persons in the day to day running of society, were empowered with leadership skills. The three-day training was conducted in Koreng Baptist Church in Kangole Sub county. The training included live streaming session facilitated by leadership coaches from the United States. Topics included qualities of a leader, the role of a leader, planning, and accountability.

The training was welcome and most of the participants wanted this to be a yearly event so that they can learn more and equip themselves for the leadership challenges of the 21st century.
